Talk It Through

1. Have you ever realized you were completely wrong about something only after someone pointed it out? How did you react at first?
2. In 2 Samuel 12, David spends months hiding his sin, yet after Nathan confronts him, he simply says, "I have sinned against the Lord." What does this passage teach you about God's heart toward people who genuinely repent? Why do you think it's often so hard for us to admit we're wrong?
3. Nathan confronted David with both truth and grace. What does this passage teach you about the value of loving correction in helping us grow spiritually?
4. Think of a time when someone corrected you. Looking back, how did you respond, and what did that experience reveal about your heart? Of the three responses from the sermon, which one do you find most difficult: stopping your defensiveness, owning your sin, or changing your sinful ways? Why?
5. Is there a conversation, apology, confession, or change that God may be prompting you to make this week? What's one practical step you can take to respond with humility instead of defensiveness?
