The Bible reminds us:

- Declare God's mighty works in praise everyday
- We have a tendency to forget to worship God, so let's be intentional

- We can return to God for forgiveness and redemption because of Jesus

» Talk It Through

1. Have you ever experienced something so amazing that you couldn't help but stop, stare, and appreciate it, but then over time, it became something you barely noticed anymore? What do you think causes that shift?
2. Isaiah reminds us that there is no one like God and that everything else we are tempted to put in His place ultimately falls short. What are some things people today can unintentionally treat like "idols," and why can they never give us what only God can?
3. The sermon points out that we can easily go through the motions of worship while our hearts are somewhere else. What are some signs that your worship or relationship with God has become more mechanical, routine, or self-focused than genuine?
4. The message challenges us to be intentional about remembering God's goodness and declaring His praise every day. What is one practical change you can make this week to become more intentional about noticing, remembering, and responding to what God is doing in your life?
